Both GCLO legal advisor and insurance agent have advised the necessity of salting all areas for the safety of the residents and their guests. Anyone not wanting their sidewalk salted must sign a release of liability (form can be acquired from Tom), and show proof of personal homeowner insurance with specified coverage before GCLO will discontinue salting any sidewalks going directly into a unit.
